8. College going remains flat, with roughly 50% of recent Hawaii public high school graduates going on to college (2 or 4 year). How do you propose to raise these levels so Hawaii is more competitive with states like California, which has a nearly 65% rate?

Students have to be taught how to read and write effectively to get into college and to graduate. Schools need to become places of learning again and not places where special interest groups and political groups conduct self interest campaigns. I will support more advanced placement classes for those students who qualify and others to qualify. I would look for more ways to connect students to community colleges and other colleges before graduation. I would try to create more opportunities for students who are struggling with reading and writing to receive free tutoring, mentoring, and accountabilty partners. A college education is received primarily through reading and writing and students who are struggling early in high school with these skills will struggle in college. It must be a prioroty to increase the proficiency in these skill sets. I will work to increase funding opportunities for students who cannot afford to attend colleges. In addition, I will look for ways to help students attend vocational schools and join the military. The military offers great educational opportunities as a benefit for enlistment.

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
