I don't expect the relationship to change. There is structurally built in tension because we control the purse strings. Unless we were to give the BOE taxing authority and make them completely independent of the Legislature, I think there will always be some tension.

7. What leadership actions will you take for the Hawaii Department of Education, University of Hawaii system, and employers to work more effectively together?

I don't think this is something achievable by bill. When opportunities arise to encourage collaboration, I will take advantage of them.

8. College going remains flat, with roughly 50% of recent Hawaii public high school graduates going on to college (2 or 4 year). How do you propose to raise these levels so Hawaii is more competitive with states like California, which has a nearly 65% rate?

It wouldn't hurt to emulate what California is doing. Having said that I don't know what that is. Making going to college "cool" would require a communications campaign and changes in attitude at the family level.
