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1. What does Hawaii do well with regards to K-12 public education?

#### 2. What should Hawaii do better with regards to K-12 public education?

The Department of Education should launch a joint recruiting incentive based campaign with current employees to fill vacant teacher, administrator, and faculty positions. Hosting regular townhall meetings with the Superintendent and a teacher task force to receive feedback from the community in the areas of: educational standards, needed facilities and equipment, career and entrepreneurship development programs, best educational practices overviews, and community best effort recognition are things and ways I believe Hawai'i should do better.


